

MILK FEVER

(Use Calject to treat)

Milk Fever is a deficiency of calcium in the bloodstream of sheep and cattle. This deficiency affects the nervous system, which in turn can affect muscle function.

Etiology:

- Onset of parturition
- Over-fat
- Reduction of Calcium intake
- Onset of lactation

Symptoms:

- Loss of appetite
- Constipation
- Bloating
- Muscle weakness which may cause the cow to stagger and / or go down
- Reduction of parturient or post parturient uterine contractions

CALJECT

The injection of Calject gives enough Calcium to cover 6 hours

The administration of Cal-Jet Oral simultaneously, increases Calcium coverage to 24 hours

FAQ's

Q. If I have a downer Cow that will not get up after I have injected with her with a dose of Cal-Ject CBG, what should I do?

A. Give her an injection of Minject 4in1 and when you get her on her feet, also give her an oral dose of Cal-Jet Oral. If she will not get up, call your vet.

Q. Where do I inject Calject CBG?

A. Subcutaneously, with a 14G needle, under the skin of the neck. This area may be massaged after administration to allow for quicker absorption
